CRAIG ROBINSON

**HEAD COACH
SECOND SEASON
PRINCETON '83**



After engineering one of the nation's best single-season turnarounds in his first year at Oregon State, Craig Robinson enters his second season at the helm of the Beavers men's basketball program.

In his first season at Oregon State, Robinson helped lead a remarkable turnaround that culminated in the Beavers capturing the College Basketball Invitational post-season tournament title with a best-of-three series win over UTEP. With the championship, the Beavers captured the first postseason men's basketball title in school history.

Under Robinson, Oregon State finished the season with an 18-18 record and had one of the greatest turnarounds in the nation as the plus-12 win total from the previous year ranked No. 3 in the country. The 18 wins were the most for Oregon State since the 1989-90 season (22) as Robinson was named District IX Coach of the Year by the United States Basketball Writers Association.

Along the way, Oregon State captured seven Pac-10 games and swept four contests from California and Stanford, marking the first time since the 1989-90 season the Beavers have swept the two schools in the same year. The seven conference wins were the most for the program since the 2004-05 season.

Several players earned all-conference and all-academic honors in Robinson's first year, led by Roeland Schaftenaar, who was named honorable mention all-league and was an academic All Pac-10 Conference selection. Calvin Haynes also earned honorable mention all-league honors as Seth Tarver was named to the honorable mention all-defensive squad.

The first year coach also saw success on the recruiting trail as the Beavers add five student-athletes for the 2009-10 school year. The class is one of the most decorated in program history and is ranked in the top 25 in the nation by several recruiting services.

Prior to joining Oregon State, Robinson spent two years as the head coach at Brown, leading a revival of the Bears program as he guided the squad to a school-record 19 victories in his final season. In his second year at Brown, Robinson led the Bears to their fourth ever post-season tournament berth, competing in the CBI. Robinson's team posted an 11-3 Ivy League mark, second best in school history, and good for second place in the conference standings. Robinson won more games (30) in his first two years than any other head coach in Brown basketball history.

OREGON STATE UNIVERSITY, 2008-PRESENT

BROWN UNIVERSITY, 2006-2008

Robinson made an immediate impact on the Brown basketball team in his first year at the helm of the program as he was named the Ivy League Men's Basketball Coach of the Year by BasketballU.com.

In his first season at Brown, Robinson guided the Bears to an improved 11-18 mark, 6-8 in the Ivy League, finishing fifth in the conference. He led the Bears to a stunning 51-41 victory over Providence College, limiting the Friars to 14 second-half points and 18-percent shooting from the floor in the second half (4-of-22). His Brown team also limited NCAA-bound Michigan State to 45 points, its lowest point total of the season.

Prior to Brown, Robinson worked at Northwestern, where he spent six seasons with the Wildcats under head coach Bill Carmody (former head coach at Princeton). Robinson's relationship with Carmody dates to the 1982-83 season when as a senior captain, he led Princeton to the second round of the NCAA Men's Basketball Championship, Carmody's first year as an assistant coach with the Tigers.

At Northwestern, Robinson developed and implemented his local, national and international recruiting technology. He was an integral part of Northwestern's dramatic turnaround, helping the Wildcats to the most wins in a four-year period in school history at the time with 57 victories from the 2001-2002 to the 2004-2005 seasons. Robinson also helped Northwestern finish ninth in the nation in scoring defense (58.8 points per game) in 2005-2006.

A 1983 graduate of Princeton with an AB (Arts of a Bachelor degree) in Sociology, Robinson is considered one of the top players in Ivy League history. He ranks fourth on Princeton's all-time scoring list with 1,441 points and led the Ivy League in field goal percentage in 1982 (.577) and 1983 (.642).

Robinson was also the league's first two-time honoree as Ivy League Player of the Year, sharing the honor in 1982 before winning it outright in 1983. He played under legendary Princeton coach Pete Carrill, leading the Tigers to two NCAA Men's Basketball Championship appearances during his tenure (1981 and 1983). His 16 rebounds in a NCAA tournament win over Oklahoma State in 1983 rank fifth in the Ivy League record book for NCAA games.

After graduating from Princeton with a degree in sociology, Robinson was drafted by the Philadelphia 76ers in the fourth round of the 1983 NBA draft. He played two seasons with the Manchester (England) Giants of the European Basketball League. In addition, he served as the assistant to the general manager and public relations officer for Manchester.

Robinson began his coaching career as an assistant coach at the Illinois Institute of Technology from 1988-90. He was responsible for offense implementation, game strategy, recruiting and advance scouting. He was also the head coach at the University of Chicago High School in 1999-2000.

Robinson, who also has a MBA in Finance from the University of Chicago Graduate School of Business (1992), took a hiatus from coaching and went into private business in 1990. He was a Vice President for Continental Bank from 1990-92, Vice President for Morgan Stanley Dean Witter from 1992-99 and then Managing Director for Loop Capital Markets before he made his move to Northwestern.

Robinson and his wife Kelly have a son, Avery, and a daughter, Leslie.

COACH ROBINSON ON... COACHING PHILOSOPHY

My coaching philosophy is to win championships, develop student-athletes for the next level both on and off the court and create and maintain a positive culture within my program. I will accomplish this using:

- local, national and international recruiting
- up-tempo, unselfish offensive schemes
- 100% student-athlete graduation
- disciplined, team-oriented defense
- fundamental basketball skills

My successful playing, coaching and professional experiences will play an integral and unique role in achieving these goals as a head coach.

STYLE OF PLAY

I will coach to the strengths of the players I recruit. The foundation of my game plan will be an up-tempo, unselfish offense anchored by a disciplined, team-oriented defense. My staff and I will teach our players offensive and defensive fundamentals emphasizing an unselfish philosophy. This is extremely important today with respect to the lack of fundamentals taught to student-athletes before college, in addition to the influx of fundamentally sound international players.

RECRUITING

I have recruited and will continue to recruit locally, nationally and internationally. Given my extensive relationships, I will recruit skillful, athletic and intelligent players whose goals are to win and learn. The players I recruit will be multi-dimensional and athletic. There will be a bias toward good shooters and defenders. Big men will be skillful runners who are comfortable on the perimeter. I have also spearheaded the development of an Internet-based recruiting tool that is currently being used by various Division I programs across the country.

This tool enables me and my staff to communicate on a regular, systematic basis with hundreds of recruits annually. My ability to recruit talented players is based on my tremendous communication skills bolstered by my skills in evaluating and developing talent. This enables me to target prospects earlier and provide them with an honest evaluation of where they fit in my plans. I believe that this up-front honesty is key to getting in early with recruits and their families.

My recruiting successes include: Michael Thompson, a former McDonald's All-American and Duke transfer who chose Northwestern over Notre Dame, UCLA, Texas and Ohio State; T.J. Parker, who was recruited by Marquette and Georgia Tech; and Vedran Vukusic, who turned down a pro contract to play for Northwestern.

ACADEMICS

Academics will never be compromised. My goal is to have a 100% graduation rate. I will recruit student athletes who have graduation at the top of their priority list. My philosophy will be supplemented with very disciplined requirements enforced by the coaching staff. The academic coaches will supervise mandatory study halls on and off the road. Tutors will be allowed to travel with the team. Players will understand that academics are equally as important as athletics.





DOUG STEWART

**ASSISTANT COACH
SECOND SEASON
BROWN '94**



Doug Stewart enters his second season as an assistant coach with the Oregon State men's basketball program after serving two seasons as an assistant men's basketball coach at Brown.

In his first year at Oregon State, Stewart helped lead a remarkable turnaround that saw the Beavers capture the College Basketball Invitational championship for the first postseason men's basketball title in school history. In all, Oregon State won 12 more games than the previous season as the turnaround ranked No. 3 in the nation.

Under Stewart's guidance, Oregon State brought in one of the most decorated recruiting classes in school history as the Beavers added five new student-athletes for the 2009-10 season. The group, which consists of several top 100 players, is ranked among the nation's best by many recruiting services.

Prior to joining Oregon State, Stewart spent two years as an assistant coach at Brown. While at Brown, Stewart helped lead a turnaround of the program as the Bears recorded a school-record 19 victories in 2007-08 and earned their fourth-ever post-season tournament berth, competing in the inaugural College Basketball Invitational. Brown posted an 11-3 Ivy League mark, second best in school history, and finished second place in the conference standings.

In his first season at Brown, Stewart helped lead Brown to an improved 11-18 mark, including a win over Providence. In addition, the Bears held Michigan State to 45 points, its lowest point total of the season.

During his time in the position, Stewart served as the recruiting coordinator and supervised strength, conditioning and academic performance and assisted with all other aspects of coaching and player development.

Prior to Brown, Stewart was the head coach at Casper College, a Division I Junior College in Casper, Wyo., for two years (2004-06) after serving as the top assistant coach at Casper during the 2003-2004 season. As an assistant coach, Casper captured the central sub-regional title. As head coach, his team either won or came within one game of winning the regional title each year.


At Casper, he was responsible for all aspects of the program including national and international recruiting, practices, scouting reports, game plans and working with the community and booster clubs.

A native of Haddonfield, N.J., Stewart was an assistant coach at Columbia for the 2002-2003 season where he developed post players, administered the strength and conditioning program, coordinated school, home and campus visits, recruited on a national basis and developed practice plans. He was part of the staff at Columbia that led the nation in scoring defense.

He also worked as the top assistant coach at Washington and Lee University in 2002 and was a player/coach and organizational representative for the Washington Generals from 1994-1999.

Stewart was a four-year letter-winner and team captain at Brown, graduating in 1994 with a bachelor's degree in economics. He was the recipient of the 1994 Thomas Hoagland Award, presented annually to the member of the varsity team who exemplifies true unselfishness through commitment and hard work both on the court and in the community.

He and his wife, Lindsay, reside in Corvallis.





NATE POMEDAY

**ASSISTANT COACH
SECOND SEASON
NORTHWESTERN '99**

Nate Pomeday enters his second season as an assistant coach with the Oregon State men's basketball program.

In his first year at Oregon State, Pomeday helped lead a remarkable turnaround that saw the Beavers capture the College Basketball Invitational championship. The title was the first postseason men's basketball championship in school history. In all, Oregon State won 12 more games than the previous season as the turnaround ranked No. 3 in the nation.

At Oregon State, Pomeday assists in all aspects of the program including national and international recruiting, scouting reports, game plans, practices and working with community and booster clubs.

Pomeday also helped Oregon State bring in one of the most decorated recruiting classes in school history as the Beavers added five new student-athletes for the 2009-10 season. The group, which consists of several top 100 players, is ranked among the nation's best by many recruiting services.

Prior to joining Oregon State, Pomeday served as an assistant coach at Lake Forest (Ill.) Academy.

In three seasons at Lake Forest Academy, Pomeday helped lead the squad to three straight Independent School League titles as the squad finished 24-10 in 2007-08. Under his guidance, where he specialized in skill development for junior varsity and varsity basketball players, several members of the program went on to receive Division I men's basketball scholarships.

Prior to arriving at Lake Forest, Pomeday served as the head coach at Calumet College (Ind.) of St. Joseph, where he was the head coach for four seasons. When he was named as the head coach for the start-up NAIA Division II program in August 2000, Pomeday was the youngest head men's basketball coach in the nation.

While at Calumet College of St. Joseph, Pomeday produced an increase in wins each year and brought the program to the upper echelon of the Chicagoland Collegiate Athletic Conference. During his four seasons, several players were named CCAC all-conference, one earned NAIA Div. II All-America honors while two former student-athletes are currently playing professionally in the International Basketball League.

His additional coaching experience includes working with Full Package Athletics, Inc., where Pomeday served as the Director of Basketball Operations for two years and has served as the head coach for the Under-17 AAU team since June 2006.

Pomeday attended Northwestern University where he was a stand-out guard for the Wildcats for four seasons. In addition to his four years on the court for the Wildcats, Pomeday has spent the past four seasons serving as the color commentator for the men's basketball program on WGN Radio.

Pomeday graduated from Northwestern in 1999 with a bachelor's degree in communication studies and is expected to receive a master's degree in sports administration from the school later this month.

The native of Cedar Grove, Wisc., resides in the Corvallis area with his wife, Heidi.



DAVID GRACE

**ASSISTANT COACH
SECOND SEASON
PARK '03**



David Grace enters his second season as an assistant coach with the Oregon State men's basketball program.

In his first year at Oregon State, Grace helped lead a remarkable turnaround that saw the Beavers capture the College Basketball Invitational championship for the first postseason men's basketball championship in school history. In all, Oregon State won 12 more games than the previous season as the turnaround ranked No. 3 in the nation.

Grace, who assists in all aspects of the Oregon State program, was instrumental in bringing in one of the most decorated recruiting classes in school history as the Beavers added five new student-athletes for the 2009-10 season. The group, which consists of several top 100 players, is ranked among the nation's best by many recruiting services.

Prior to Oregon State, Grace served as an assistant coach at the University of San Francisco for one season. In addition to his collegiate coaching experience, Grace served as the head coach at South Mountain High School in Phoenix, Ariz., for two seasons, where he led the Jaguars to a 5A Div. II state championship. The team went 29-4 and the state title was the first for South Mountain since 1992. In addition, he led the team to a state playoff appearance in 2004-05. One year prior to his arrival, South Mountain had finished just 4-17.

A native of Aberdeen, Md., Grace was head coach of the Arizona Magic in 2004, leading the team to a national ranking of 21st and an eighth place finish at the Big Time Tournament in Las Vegas. The eighth-place finish was the best in the history of any AAU team from the state of Arizona.

Grace also coached the Compton Magic in 2005 and 2006. With the Magic, Grace helped develop players Lawrence Hill (Stanford), Joey Shaw (Indiana), Harvey Perry (Washington), Christian Polk (Arizona State), Ray Murdock (San Diego), James Anderson (BYU), Nkem Ojougboh (Northeastern), Tim Maiden (Texas-San Antonio), Bryson Krueger (Arizona State), Devon Evertsen (Grand Canyon via Boston College), Luis Ahmundson (Sacramento Kings) and Derek Wabbington (Harlem Globetrotters) among others.

Prior to his stint at South Mountain, Grace spent four years (2000-04) as an assistant varsity coach at Trevor Browne High School in Phoenix. That team reached the Final Four in 2003, and was ranked among the top 40 schools in the nation by The Sporting News prior to the 2003-04 season. During his time at Trevor Browne, Grace helped develop Ty Morrison (Creighton), Daren Jordan (Oral Roberts) and Kaleo Kina (Navy).

Grace, who spent 20 years in the Air Force, is a 2003 graduate of Park University in Parkville, Mo., where he graduated cum laude with a degree in human resources and a 3.67 GPA.





JAIMEE COLBERT

ASST. COORDINATOR OF OPERATIONS - THIRD YEAR

Jaimee Colbert is entering her third season as assistant coordinator of operations for the Oregon State men's basketball team. As part of her duties, Colbert will assist in all facets of the program, including team travel, budget management, Oregon State camps and clinics, fundraising and on-campus recruiting.

A graduate of Oregon State, Colbert joined the men's basketball program after earning several honors as a student of OSU. While a student at Oregon State, she served as Memorial Union President for the 2006-2007 year and was a scholarship Naval ROTC student throughout college.

A Lawrence, Kan., native and a 1999 graduate of Drake University with a degree in journalism, Collins also has served in public relations roles for the Eugene (Ore.) Symphony Association and Dynamac Corporation, an environmental firm based in Washington, D.C.

Katrina Grubert begins her seventh year at Oregon State working with the men's basketball team as an athletic academic counselor.

In her role, she handles all aspects of academic support, including facilitating study plans and tutor sessions, working with student-athletes in tracking progress towards degrees and monitoring student-athlete eligibility.
