#### **2011 SPRING GAME**

Oregon State's 2011 Spring Game will be held Saturday, April 30 at 12:15 p.m. at Reser Stadium.

DIFFICULT SCHEDULE: Oregon State's 2010 schedule concluded being ranked the most difficult in the country according to the Sagarin rankings. OSU played No. 2 TCU (final AP ranking), No. 3 Oregon, No. 4 Stanford and No. 9 Boise State. The 2011 schedule, the first for the Pac-12 Conference, includes out of league games at No. 7 Wisconsin (2010 ranking) and at home vs. BYU and Sacramento State. The Beavers did defeat two top-20 teams during the course of last season, beating then No. 9 Arizona in Tucson and then No. 20 USC in Corvallis.

PAC-12 BEGINS: Oregon State, a North Division member of the Pac-12 Conference, plays its first new-look league game Sept. 24 against UCLA at Reser Stadium in Corvallis. The team's first North Division game is Oct. 22 at Qwest Field against Washington State. The Beavers not only play in the home of the Seattle Seahawks they also appear for the second time in the San Francisco Giants' AT&T Park Nov. 12 against California – OSU defeated Maryland in the 2007 Emerald Bowl at the Park. In 2011 and '12 OSU will not play Pac-12 foes Colorado or USC.

WE SHOULD HAVE HAD A VOTE ...: for the Heisman Trophy in 2010. Of the four finalists that traveled to New York City, three played against the Beavers – Andrew Luck (Stanford), LaMichael James (Oregon) and Kellen Moore (Boise State).

**ATTENDANCE:** Oregon State set a school record for home attendance in 2010, averaging 45,509 per game, which included a Reser Stadium record 46,469 vs. Oregon. The school also sold a record 26,952 season tickets.

RILEY COULD BECOME THE TOP: Eleventh-year head coach Mike Riley could become Oregon State's all-time winningest football coach this season. Riley enters 2011 with 69 wins, five short of Lon Stiner (1933-48). Riley has the second most victories in the conference at one school among active coaches, trailing the 72 of Cal's Jeff Tedford.

#### PAEA EARNS PRESTIGIOUS HONOR:

Senior defensive tackle Stephen Paea ended his illustrious three-year career by being named the 2010 Pac-10 Pat Tillman Defensive Player of the Year. The consensus All-American also received the league's Morris Trophy for the second straight year as being the top defensive lineman as voted on by the conference's opposing offensive linemen. He also went on to break the NFL Combine's bench press lifting record, achieving 49 reps at 225 pounds.

#### **BEAVER FACTS**

QUIZZ IN GOOD COMPANY: Running back Jacquizz Rodgers, who declared for the NFL Draft after his junior season of 2010, leaves OSU as one of only three running backs in Pac-10 Conference history to be named to the league's first team three years, joining Napolean Kauffman (1992-94) of Washington and Charles White (1977-79) of USC. He also is the first Beaver ever to earn first team conference honors three years. Rodgers left OSU second on the school's all-time rushing chart with 3,877 yards; sixth in Pac-10 history.

JAMES RODGERS RETURNS: While senior receiver James Rodgers will miss spring practice while rehabilitating from a knee injury, he is anticipated to be back for the 2011 season. Rodgers, who was granted a fifth year of eligibility as a medical hardship, enters the season with the second-most all-purpose yards for active players in the FBS with an OSU record 5,784. He also is seventh among active players for kickoff return yards with 2,124 (36 shy of OSU's record), fourth at OSU for career receiving yards with 2,064 and third for total receptions with 177. He will likely be on several postseason awards watch lists for 2011.

**SPECIAL, SPECIAL TEAMS:** The 2010 team set a school record for kickoff return yards average at 26.4 and had the third-best mark for punt returns yards per game at 14.8. **James Rodgers** had a 13.7 yards per punt return average for the season which is a school record.

**COACHING CHANGES:** Reggie Davis, the team's running backs coach for three years, left the staff following the season to join the San Francisco 49ers. Graduate assistant coach Robin Ross moved on to a full-time position at UNLV. Former Beavers **Alan Darlin** (LB, 2004-07) and **Mitch Meeuwsen** (S, 2001-04) were added as graduate assistants for 2011.

#### SECOND-YEAR STARTING QUARTER-

**BACKS:** Junior **Ryan Katz** steps behind center for his second year as a starter, and that usually means good things in the OSU system. In Derek Anderson's (2001-04) second year in **Mike Riley's** system he passed for the second-most yardage in OSU single season history (2,914) and for the most touchdowns ever in one season (29) in leading OSU to an Insight Bowl victory over Notre Dame. In 2006, Matt Moore (2005-06) passed for 3,022 yards on his way to guiding the Beavers to a victory in the Sun Bowl over Missouri. In 2008 Lyle Moevao and Sean Canfield teamed up to pace the Beavers to a 9-4 record and a Sun Bowl victory over Pittsburgh.

**BOUNCING BACK:** Oregon State enters 2011 looking to rebound from its first losing season (5-7) since 2005 (5-6). The Beavers have been pretty good following a losing season of late, posting a 10-4 mark in 2006 and 8-5 in 2002.

**RUNNING BACK U:** Former Oregon State running backs Ken Simonton, Yvenson Bernard and Jacquizz Rodgers all rank in the top 10 of the Pac-12 Conference for career rushing. USC and OSU are the only schools in the league with more than one player in the top 10, each with three.

1,000-YARD RUSHER FOR 2011? Oregon State has had a player rush for 1,000-plus yards every season starting in 2005. In fact, since Ken Simonton's 1,028 yards in 1998, the only years the Beavers have failed to produce a 1,000-yard rusher was in 2001 and '04. Starting with that '98 season, OSU has had a player rush for 1,000-plus yards a Pac-12 leading 11 times, followed most closely by Oregon (10), Cal (8) and USC (6).

**264:** The number of starts returning Beavers have combined, led by tackle **Mike Remmers** with 32 and receiver **James Rodgers** with 30. OSU lost a combined 289 starts, including 38 from center Alex Linnenkohl, 37 from defensive tackle Stephen Paea and 35 from running back Jacquizz Rodgers ... 91 is another key number for the Beavers heading into the 2011 campaign. OSU's four returning starting offensive linemen - Remmers, **Grant Johnson** (25), **Michael Philipp** (22) and **Burke Ellis** (12) - have combined for 91 starts.

#### HEAD COACH BIOGRAPHY



Mike Riley has rightfully been credited with the rebirth of Oregon State football. The 58-year-old head coach has guided the Beavers to six bowl games in the last eight years, winning five, and started the rejuvenation of the program during his first tenure in 1997-98 that subsequently made three postseason appearances.

A member of the American Football Coaches Association's (AFCA) Board of Trustees and Ethics Committee, Riley is the second winningest coach in Beaver football history with 69 victories – 5 short of matching Lon Stiner's (1933-48) total. His resume sparkles with achievements, including the 2008 AFCA and Pac-10 Conference Coach of the Year, and his teams have appeared in the final Associated Press top-25 rankings in three of the last five years.

The 11th-year head coach has also led his team to outstanding success in the classroom, where over the last four years Beavers have been honored by the Pac-10 for academic achievement 49 times. He's also developed future NFL players with 21 (as of April 1) draftees since his second arrival in 2003 and has had 71 all-conference selections.

Riley is the first coach in OSU history to win more than one NCAA-sanctioned bowl game at OSU, capturing the 2003 Las Vegas Bowl, the 2004 Insight Bowl, the 2006 and 2008 Sun Bowls, and the 2007 Emerald Bowl titles. He also is the first coach to lead the program to more than one winning conference season (5-3 in '04, 6-3 in '06, 6-3 in '07, 7-2 in '08 and 6-3 in '09) since 1969.

His 2010 team played the most difficult schedule in the nation competing against four teams that finished the year in the top seven of the national polls, and winning two games over top-25 teams. The team featured defensive tackle Stephen Paea earning Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Year and for the second time was named the recipient of the league's Morris Trophy, awarded to the conference's top defensive lineman. Jacquizz Rodgers earned Pac-10 First Team for the third consecutive season and joins just two other former Pac-10 running backs (Napolean Kauffman and Charles White) as three-time honorees. Riley also led the "Beaver Nation" charge to school records for average home attendance (45,509) and for season ticket sales (26,952).

In 2009, Riley and his staff had a monumental task of replacing nearly every starter on defense and a total of seven NFL draftees. The Beavers not only qualified for a bowl game, but also for the second straight year played the season finale for the opportunity to receive the Rose Bowl berth. A league-high seven Beavers earned first team All-Pac-10 honors and the team finished higher than the preseason predictions for the fourth consecutive year.

The 2008 Beavers lost more starters than any other Pac-10 team, but Riley and his staff found replacements within the program to turn what was expected to be a rebuilding year into a 9-4 season and the program's second-best ever mark in the Pac-10 Conference at 7-2 (tied for second). All of this while playing a schedule that was considered one of the toughest in the nation that included three BCS bowl teams (USC, Utah, Penn State). The keynote victory of the season was a 27-21 win over then No. 1 USC Sept. 25 -- at the time the Beavers were unranked. The season culminated with a 3-0 victory over No. 18 Pittsburgh

in the Sun Bowl, a game OSU played without two of the team's top three offensive weapons – Pac-10 Offensive MVP and All-America running back Jacquizz Rodgers and his brother receiver James Rodgers. The team ended the year No. 18 in the final Associated Press Poll and No. 19 in the USA Today.

His 2007 team won seven of the final eight games on the way to a 9-4 mark, just one game behind co-Pac-10 champions USC and Arizona State at 6-3 in the league. The team won at No. 2 California when a Bear victory would have moved them to No. 1 and beat No. 18 Oregon in Eugene. The defensive unit finished first in the nation against the run and accumulated the most yards lost via tackles than any other team in the Football Bowl Subdivision.

The 2006 team became only the second club in OSU history to capture at least 10 victories – winning eight of the last nine, including defeating No. 3 USC, No. 24 Hawai'i and Oregon. To cap one of the best seasons in school history, the Beavers won a thrilling game over Missouri (39-38) in arguably the best Sun Bowl ever played. The final summary of the season showed OSU finishing third in the Pac-10, just one game behind co-winners USC and California.

In 2004 the team accepted the challenge of playing both the '03 defending national champions, the eventual 2004 national champions and faced one of the most difficult schedules overall in the nation. The team fought through early setbacks before defeating Oregon in the annual Civil War in then record fashion. The victory over the archrivals propelled OSU to a convincing 38-21 victory over Notre Dame in the 16th annual Insight Bowl. The Beavers closed 2004 winning six of their final seven games and pushing Orange Bowl/National champion USC to the wire.

The hometown boy—he attended Corvallis High School—returned to the Beaver sideline for the second time and led the program to the 2003 Las Vegas Bowl title. His '03 team set numerous individual and team records, and led the Pac-10 Conference for both offense and defense. He followed up the '03 team's success by signing the program's best ever recruiting class, according to several scouting organizations.

Riley left Oregon State after the 1998 season to pursue a unique opportunity to become the head coach of the National Football League's San Diego Chargers. He spent four years in the NFL, returning to Oregon State after a one-year stint as an assistant with the New Orleans Saints.

Riley was a popular choice when he was originally hired for the position in late December of 1996 and was equally as popular upon his hiring the second time

Riley calls Corvallis his hometown, although he was born in Wallace, Idaho. He grew up watching Beaver football, as his father Bud was an assistant coach for the program from 1965-72 and again in 1979. Mike was a standout quarterback at Corvallis High School, leading the Spartans to the 1970 state title.

Riley, who already had coaching in his blood at a young age, made the deci-

sion to continue playing the sport in college at the University of Alabama for legendary coach Paul "Bear" Bryant. He played cornerback from 1971-74, helping the Tide to four Southeastern Conference titles and the 1973 national championship.

Riley immediately launched a successful coaching career following his graduation from Alabama. His first stop was as a defensive graduate assistant coach for Mike White at the University of California in 1975. He helped the Bears to an 8-3 record and a share of the Pacific-8 Conference title, the first and only for the program since the Pac-8/10 Conference was formed in 1968.

He continued his education and his coaching in 1976 at Whitworth College in Spokane, Wash. He finished his master's degree in physical education in 1977 while working for the popular Pacific Northwest coach and future Canadian Football League legend Hugh Campbell.

Riley's first full-time appointment came at NAIA powerhouse Linfield College in McMinnville, Ore. From 1977-82 he served as the program's defensive coordinator and secondary coach, as well as assistant athletic director. Riley assisted head coach Ad Rutschman's Wildcats to a six-year record of 52-7-1, which included five conference titles and the 1982 undefeated NAIA title team.

An opportunity to coach in the professional ranks presented itself following the '82 season, and Riley was on his way to the Canadian Football League's Winnipeg Blue Bombers as the secondary coach. During his three-years as an assistant, Winnipeg produced a 32-15-1 mark and won the 1984 Grey Cup title.

Riley returned to the college level in 1986 as an assistant coach at the University of Northern Colorado, before being named the youngest coach in CFL history in 1987 with Winnipeg at 33-years of age. Riley guided the Bombers to two Grey Cup titles (1988, '90) and was named the CFL's Coach of the Year in those seasons. He was inducted into the club's Hall of Fame June 13, 2007.

In 1991 Riley took over the San Antonio Riders of the World Football League, spending two seasons before the league suspended its North American opera-

tions.

He returned to the college ranks in 1993 when then USC head coach John Robinson offered him the position of offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach – he later became assistant head coach. The Mesa (Ariz.) Tribune named him the league's top assistant coach in 1993 after leading the Trojan offense to record setting numbers. Then USC quarterback Rob Johnson earned numerous Pac-10 and NCAA records, and would later become a first-round draft pick.

Riley remained at USC through the 1997 season, helping the Trojans to victories in the Rose, Cotton, and Freedom Bowls. USC won one outright league title, shared another and finished second one time.

In addition, Riley has been the head coach for three postseason all-star games – the Hula Bowl, East-West Shrine Game and Blue-Gray All-Star Classic.

Mike and his wife Dee are the parents of one son, Matthew, and one daughter, Kate. Matthew, an OSU graduate, is currently employed within the Beaver Athletic Department as a video specialist and Kate is a senior at OSU. Mike's brother, Edward Riley, is a physician and Associate Professor at the Stanford University School of Medicine.


Riley is under contract at OSU through at least 2019 – his contract rolls over one year for every time the team plays in a bowl game.

His success at all levels is well documented. Riley has earned the respect of players, coaches, media and fans. He has been called the savior of Oregon State football and the future continues to look bright for the Orange and Black.
