Season Outlook

To be the best you have to beat the best. The 2008-2009 Oregon State men's crew takes these words to heart as it prepares to compete against some of the best crews in the country over the course of the spring season. The Beavers are counting on several veteran rowers, as well as some talented underclassmen in their quest for a 15th consecutive appearance at the IRA Championships.

The Beavers will see the return of several experienced rowers as well as senior Beth Olsen, who coxed last year's Varsity 8+ crew. Olsen will be joined by fellow seniors Ian George and Jon Young, both of whom spent the entire 2008 season rowing in the V8+. Junior Mike Buckiewicz also brings a full season of varsity experience. Senior Will Gustafson and junior Bronson Shafer add further depth to the team with both having earned spots in the varsity boat during their careers with Shafer earning a promotion to the V8+ for the Beavers in the Pac-10 and IRA Championships.

Several rowers from last year's JV8+ and freshman crews are eager to show their development and earn seats in the varsity boat. Seniors David Weir and Campbell Woods provide experience and are expected to compete for spots in this year's varsity. In addition, head coach Steve Todd is particularly excited about his talented class of sophomores, including rowers Rob Hannah, Mike Luecker, Evan Peterson and Joe Wainwright and coxswain Stefan Evano. All five were members of the Beavers' Freshman 4+ that produced a fifth place finish at the IRA Champs.

"The varsity competition is wide open," Todd said. "Of all the upperclassmen, everyone has a shot. We just have to see how things go and how the training progresses."

The competition for the seats on the varsity boat will be influenced by the summer competition faced by several Beavers. Weir was selected as a member of the United States U23 National Team and earned a seat in the U.S. men's 4+ crew. Weir's training with the U23 team resulted in a trip to Brandenburg, Germany for the 2008 FISA World Rowing U23 Championships, where Weir's crew finished fifth.

Shafer also found success while rowing for the Pennsylvania Athletic Club Rowing Association. Shafer rowed in the bow-seat of the Penn A.C. Senior 8+ crew, which won their division at the 126th Royal Canadian Henley Regatta and finished second at the U.S. Club Nationals. Shafer also helped lead the Penn A.C. Intermediate 8+ crew to a first place finish at the U.S. Club Nationals.

George and Buckiewicz attended the USRowing Northwest Development Camp, over the summer to work on their strength and technique. Buckiewicz continued his summer experience by securing a spot as a member of the Senior Pair that went on to finish third at the U.S. Club Nationals.

Once the crews are assembled, the Beavers will begin a season that pits them against some of the premier crews in the country. Oregon State will begin its spring season with dual races against regional foes University of Victoria and Gonzaga. The Beavers will travel to Victoria, B.C. on March 7th to meet their Canadian rivals for the fourth consecutive year. The trip to Spokane, Wash. two weeks later matches the Beavers up against an up-and-coming Gonzaga crew that sent two boats, including its Varsity 8+, to the IRA Championships last season.

"These are two good races and the trip to Victoria is pretty early in the season. It will be a good gauge of where we are early on," Todd said. "I think both crews are very competitive and will help get us ready for San Diego."

It is in San Diego where the Beavers are slated to compete in the 36th annual San Diego Crew Classic, held over the weekend of April 4-5. The race features a varsity field of 10 of the strongest crews in the country, all of which competed in the 2008 IRA Championships. Oregon State will be one of four Pac-10 crews in attendance while Ivy League crews from Harvard, Princeton, Brown and Yale will make the cross-country trip. Varsity crews from Michigan and Syracuse round out the field. With six of the crews in San Diego coming off top 10 finishes in 2008, and all 10 having competed at the 2008 IRA Championships the competition will be fierce.

The Beavers will get a chance at revenge against a Syracuse crew that they raced at last year in San Diego and twice at the IRA Championships. The final match came in the Third Level Final at the IRA's where the Orange defeated the Beavers by a mere .2 seconds to win the race.

"Three of these teams Washington (second), California (third), and Stanford (fifth) were in the IRA Grand Final last year," Todd said. "It shows you that San Diego is a really big race and all ten varsity crews should be ranked in the top 20 at the beginning of the season. It should be a tough race, but it is always a lot of fun in San Diego."

Following a two week respite, the Beavers travel to Redwood Shores, Calif. to meet Pac-10 rivals Stanford and California as well as defending IRA Champion Wisconsin. Todd realizes the talent of the Beavers opponents but is confident in his team, saying; "We are stacking our schedule very heavy, but these are the crews we have to compete against in order to improve."

In one last test before the Pac-10 Championships, the Oregon State crew gets a unique opportunity after being invited to compete in the Windermere Cup at the Opening Day Regatta in Seattle, Wash. In recent years the Beavers have sent both junior varsity and freshman crews to the Opening Day Regatta, but this will be the first year in which the whole team, including the Varsity 8+ will compete. In addition to facing off against another Pac-10 opponent in Washington, the Beavers will be matched up against the Brazilian National Team in a race that will provide valuable experience heading into the championship portion of their schedule.

The Beavers return to Rancho Cordova, Calif. for the Pac-10 Championships on May 10. A strong performance at Lake Natoma could give Oregon State a shot at a 15th consecutive invitation to compete at the IRA Championships. For the first time ever, the IRA Championships are to be raced on the West Coast, on the same course that will be used for the Pac-10 Championships.

"It is important to compete hard this year, because going to IRA Championships in their first year on the west coast would be a big step for our program," Todd said. "It's a great racecourse and I am glad they are finally bringing the IRAs out here."

Assisting Todd this year is the newest addition to the Oregon State coaching staff. Gabe Winkler comes to Corvallis after spending two seasons as the men's lightweight assistant coach at Rutgers. Before beginning his coaching career, Winkler was a seven-time member of the US National team, earning various international medals including two World Championships. Winkler is in charge of the Beavers freshman crews during the 2008-2009 season.

Todd is excited by the hire, saying; "He has done a good job with the freshman, introducing them to the sport, and really showing them a strong passion for competing. His knowledge and background as an international athlete has really encouraged these young guys and I think they will be very fit and strong this year."

Steve Todd enters his third season as the head coach of the Oregon State University men's rowing program.

Under Todd, Oregon State has sustained a run of 14 straight appearances at the Intercollegiate Rowing Association (IRA) Championships that placing it as one of the elite rowing programs in the nation.

In his two seasons at the helm, the Oregon State rowing team has finished 10th and 15th in the country. In addition to the varsity crew's top 10 finish in 2007, the Beavers' Junior Varsity 8+ and Freshman 4+ have combined to collect three top-10 finishes in two years.

Todd succeeded former head coach Fred Honebein in June 2006 after the Beavers finished 14th at the IRAs.

In Todd's initial foray into leading the Beavers he took two boats to Europe leading Oregon State to an impressive showing at the Czech Republic national championships. The trip marked the first international competition for the Oregon State rowing program. The Beavers Varsity 8 and Varsity 4 shells both rowed to victories over crews containing athletes that went on to represent the Czech Republic at the 2006 U-23 World Championships.

Prior to earning the head job, Todd had been a part of the Oregon State rowing program for four years as the men's freshman coach.

During his time with the Beavers, Todd's crews medaled all four years at the Pac-10 Championships including a silver medal finish in 2008. Todd's 2003 crew of rookies also took second at the prestigious San Diego Crew Classic and in the process upset traditional powerhouse Washington. Most recently, Todd's Freshman 4+ finished fourth at the IRA Regatta in June.

Todd began his coaching career as the assistant freshman coach at Washington under Honebein, while also maintaining the duties of boathouse manager from 1999-2001. While assisting Honebein, Todd helped the Husky freshman boat to the IRA national championship in 2001 and a silver medal in 2000. He served one year as the men's freshman coach at Georgetown University prior to his arrival at Oregon State in 2002.

Todd also boasts an impressive career as an oarsman including a silver medal in the varsity eight at the 1998 IRA National Championships and a bronze at the IRA in 1999. As a member of the junior varsity in 1997, his boat won the Pac-10 championship and went on to win the IRA national championship, helping the Huskies to complete a rare sweep of all three major races at the IRAs. That year the Huskies also raced internationally at the Henley Royal Regatta in Henley, England. He rowed at Washington from 1996-99.

Before rowing at Washington, Todd raced in high school for Green Lake Crew in Seattle. He helped Green Lake to a third place finish at the US Rowing Youth Invitational in 1995.

He is a 2000 graduate of Washington with a degree in speech communication. Married in 2005, Steve and his wife, Rachel, live in Corvallis with their dog, Marli.

Gabe Winkler, a seven-time U.S. national team member, worked two seasons as the men's lightweight coach at Rutgers University. While at Rutgers, Winkler controlled all aspects of the novice lightweight crew including the technique, training and recruiting.

Winkler's impressive rowing resume includes international success in both sweep and sculling events; in both lightweight and heavyweight divisions. In 2007, Winkler won a gold, in the heavyweight 8+, and silver, in the heavyweight 4-, at the Pan-American Games. He was also part of a gold medal crew at the 2000 World Championships in the lightweight 8+.

While with the U.S. National Team, Winkler rowed at the 1998 Nation's Cup in the Under-23 lightweight 4; the 2000 FISA World Championships in the lightweight 8; the 2001 and 2002 FISA World Championships in the lightweight 4; 2004 FISA World Championships in the lightweight 8; the 2006 sculling spare; and the 2007 Pan-American Championships in the heavyweight 8 and heavyweight 4. Gabe has also captured numerous National Championships in lightweight events and a Head of the Charles Championship in the Lightweight 4+.

A 1999 graduate of Cornell, Winkler has a degree in plant science.

James Fulmer is entering his first year as a volunteer coach for the Oregon State men's crew after a successful two-year run as a member of the Beavers Varsity 8+ crew.

Fulmer came to Corvallis after a two-year stint at Rutgers University, where he began his collegiate rowing career. James chose to transfer to Oregon State. With the Beavers, Fulmer helped lead the Varsity 8+ crew to consecutive fourth place finishes in the Pac-10, as well as two berths in the IRA Championships. For his efforts in his senior year, Fulmer was named a member of the 2008 Pac-10 All-Conference first team.

Outside of rowing, Fulmer still finds ways to make an impact. He was named the Community Service Chairman of the Oregon State Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) for the 2007-08 school year. Fulmer's efforts in the classroom his senior year were also rewarded when he was named to the 2008 Pac-10 All-Academic first team. Oregon State athletics honored Fulmer during the 2007-08 season by naming him an Everyday Champion.







Q&A with Josh Inman

About the progression from Oregon State to the US National Team

"When I started rowing at Oregon State in 1998 I was a true novice, which means I did not have any rowing experience. I had actually never heard of rowing as a sport at all. At first I knew nothing about rowing, but I slowly got into it. As I progressed I learned to like it more and more over the next four years. When I was done, I decided it was something I wanted to continue doing."

What got you to try out for the US National Team?

"When I graduated from Oregon State I didn't really have any plans to continue rowing. I just slowly started training again and I found that I missed training. I enjoyed doing workouts and getting out on the water every day. I kept doing it a little bit more every day and eventually started putting together some results that I thought could get me somewhere internationally. That's when I decided to move out to Philadelphia."

Describe your rowing experience at Oregon State.

"I couldn't even imagine what it would have been like to not row my four years at Oregon State. It just added a social element and also the training element, together with what I was doing in school. The dedication required really altered my college experience and made it something that I think was a lot better than if I had not been rowing."

On the increased presence of Beaver Nation

"I can see that since I went to school here there have been some obvious changes in the facilities. It gives great opportunities for the athletes that are here now. The Truax center was built while I was here, the renovation to Reser Stadium was also built, as well as the Sports Performance Center. Everywhere on campus that you look you see buildings and new facilities, and I think that adds a lot for the student-athletes that are here."

On being named to the US Olympic team

"When I was initially selected for the team it was through the pair trials, so I rowed in a smaller boat. When I secured a spot on the team it was something that, at the time we were in such a hectic training environment, trying to get lined up and set with the boats and trying to make the team, that it took a while for it to set in. I didn't really realize the impact of it because now I have this new thing (the Olympics) that I'm training for and have all my focus on that. Instead of thinking about what I have done I was more thinking about what needed to be done in the future."

Describe Beijing

"Beijing was absolutely incredible. You could see all of the venues and everything. The Olympics kind of eclipsed the city almost. It seemed like it was on top of the city. It wasn't like being in Beijing; it was being at the Olympics. Just the enthusiasm of the people that were there, and the amount of effort that went into making the Olympics run smoothly was apparent everywhere that we looked. It made for a really great experience there."

What was it like being in the Olympic Village?

"The Olympic Village was an experience all to itself. The sheer size of it was one thing; the dining hall itself was probably the size of a football stadium. It had every kind of food you could imagine. I would say the most notable thing was being surrounded by all of the other Olympians. All of these dedicated athletes and the energy that comes with having all of these people in one place."

Did you meet anyone interesting or go to any of the other events during your time in Beijing?

"After we competed we got the chance to go see some other events. We saw the gold medal basketball final, which was a great experience. We had excellent seats to watch that. We also cheered on the volleyball team and the baseball team."

What led to the US Rowing team winning the bronze medal?

"The race progression was kind of an emotional roller coaster. We had a slightly disappointing heat and we had really expected to do well. Not performing well in the first race really made it sink in that we had a lot of work to do to come out of this with a medal. I thought that when we went to the repechage we made some great improvements. It was really inspiring to know that we could improve our race plan and improve our rowing in such a short amount of time. When we finally got to the final I felt like everything just fell into place. We had a really good race. We executed our race plan. That was just a really good feeling, knowing that we set

out to do something and we did it exactly as we planned, and it paid off in the end."

On the medal race

"When we came into the final race, we were dead last in the first 500 meters, which was discouraging but I felt like everyone in the boat really kept their head up and did what they had to do. I was really impressed with all of my teammates and with myself too for executing that race plan. It looked like we were down; it would have been easy to give up. But we stayed confident. It was just a really good feeling to know that we executed our plan, and that it worked."

What were your feelings as you crossed the finish line?

"When we crossed the finish line, I actually couldn't tell if we were behind or in front of Great Britain because the margin was so close. We knew we would come out of it with a medal and when the times came up on the screen, it was exhilarating to see the USA up there with our time and knowing that we had won a medal."

How did rowing at Oregon State impact your life?

"Rowing is something that I would have never had the opportunity to do if I hadn't come here. I have to give credit to my coaches, my freshman coach Matt Imes, and my head coach Dave Reischman for introducing me to the sport and teaching me a little bit about it. They kept riding me to make sure that I kept at it and signed up for the class and kept doing it. It has been a defining influence on my life. I can't even imagine what I would be doing if I wasn't rowing."

US National Team

Former Rowers, Hansen and Inman, Getting It Done for National Team

Oregon State has long been a powerhouse for men's rowing, providing 14 different athletes to the highest levels of rowing in the U.S. and over the past five years, a pair of former Beavers have represented America and the Oregon State rowing program particularly well.

OSU graduate Josh Inman ('03) earned 2005 USRowing Male Athlete of the Year after winning the 2005 World Rowing Championships with the U.S. National Team men's 8+. In addition, Inman's former teammate at OSU, Joey Hansen ('01) helped his boat to a gold medal at the 2004 Olympics in Athens.

On top of these impressive honors and accolades, Inman and Hansen have something else in common... neither had rowed prior to arriving at OSU.

Inman learned to row his first year at Oregon State after a successful cross country and track career at Hillsboro High School in Hillsboro, Ore. "I took the rowing class like a lot of freshman (at OSU)," he said. "By the time we got to our first racing season in the spring, I was hooked."

From the start, Inman showed remarkable talent, according to Matt Imes, Inman's freshman coach at OSU and current national team assistant. "The question was, did he have the drive to do what it takes to achieve his potential?" Imes said.

Inman put any doubts to rest in January 2004, when he began training with the U.S. National Team during the Olympic selection process.

"I think it opened up his eyes to the commitment and the sacrifice it takes to get there," Imes said. Inman didn't make an Olympic boat, but did win a seat in the coxed four that eventually won a bronze medal at the 2004 World Championships in Spain.

Inman says he takes his training one day at a time, but the 2008 Olympics in Beijing "has always been in the back of my mind."

Hansen has a similar story. He knew nothing about rowing prior to his freshman year at Oregon State, but at 6-foot-6 and 215 pounds, Hansen had the physical tools to succeed. What he needed was the technical expertise of the OSU coaches to begin to reach his potential.

"Our coaching staff really worked with me a lot on technique," Hansen said. "They just kept pushing me every single day. They'd say 'You've got to change this,' and finally, I changed some things... and things started falling into place."

Mix the coaching with natural athletic ability and a relentless work ethic, and Hansen has proven that one can create success for oneself in rowing.

During the fall of his senior year, the Bakersfield, Calif., native recorded one of the fastest ergometer times in the country, even topping United States National Team rowers.

That feat only set the pace for the final stage of his career at Oregon State, as the three-time All-Pac-10 first-teamer led OSU to 10th place at nationals before graduating Oregon State. He then went on to become a three-time member of the U.S. National Team after earning one of eight seats in the country's most prestigious boat, the heavyweight eight, which took the gold medal at the 2004 Olympics in Greece.

"It's such an endurance sport," Hansen said. "It's a training sport. The more you train, the faster you are and the better you get. I've got an engineering degree from Oregon State, and that means a lot. The engineering school here is awesome."

Oregon State History

In the fall of 1926, two rowing shells arrived in Corvallis by train with the California football team. They were a gift from the California Rowing Club and, at the time, they were stored in the basement of Fairbanks Hall. By 1929, the Oregon State Rowing Club (OSRC) was under way and won its first race against the University of Washington.

By 1935 the crew was traveling up and down the coast in search of competition. Crew was temporarily suspended during World War II, but received a tremendous boost in 1950 when the OSU business office purchased 160 acres of land on the east side of the Willamette River about a mile from campus. The new land would be developed into the Trysting Tree Golf Club and a waterfront facility that would become the home of Oregon State University rowing.

Throughout its history, rowing at Oregon State has been led by committed and visionary coaching. Ed Stevens, a former Harvard coach, took over the reins from Mechanical Engineering Professor J.P. Othis. Stevens guided the program from 1931 to 1949 and during this time the program gained recognition and respect as a highly competitive crew.

Karl Drlica took over from Coach Stevens and would lead the program for the next 30 years. One of Coach Drlica's first moves was to establish women as an integral part of the program when he started intramural competition in 1952. OSU was one of the first collegiate programs to support women's rowing.

The achievements of Coach Drlica and his crews were recognized in 1967 when the Board of Intercollegiate Athlet-

ics accepted the men's heavyweight crew as a varsity sport. Ten years later, Coach Drlica would orchestrate the elevation of women's and lightweight rowing to varsity status as well.


In 1983 the athletic department hired Dave Emigh to assist with the crew program and in 1985 he was named the head coach. Emigh spent 11 years at OSU and continued to develop the program with the same innovative styles of his predecessors.

Dave Reischman assumed the reigns at Oregon State in the fall of 1994. In his time at OSU he brought the Beavers into the national coaches polls and competed at the Intercollegiate Rowing Championships each of his nine years at OSU. Reischman led the Beavers to the best overall performance by an OSU crew in 2002 when his Varsity 8+ remained in the top 10 of the polls throughout the year and finished off the year by finishing 4th at the IRA National Championship.

In 2002 Kjell Oswald, the former freshman coach for Reischman, moved up to take over the head coach position. Oswald helped to continue OSU's recent national success with two top 10 finishes in 2003 and 2004. Fred Honebein, a 1996 US Olympian and 1994 World Champion, came to Corvallis from the University of Washington in the fall of 2004 to guide the program. Honebein led the Beavers to their third straight top 10 finish and their eighth top 10 finish in ten years.

Current OSU head coach, Steve Todd, succeeded Honebein following the 2006 IRA Championships following four seasons as the novice coach for the Beavers. Todd's first order of business after taking over the helm at Oregon State was an overseas trip to the Czech Republic. Under Todd's direction, OSU's Varsity 8+ and Varsity 4+ boats earned impressive victories over the Czech's best crews at the country's national championships.

In 2007, Todd's first full season leading the Beavers, the Varsity 8+ earned a 10th place finish at the IRA Championships to finish the season in the nation's top 10 for the eighth time in ten years. In 2008, Todd's varsity crew once again earned a fourth place finish at the Pac-10 Championships before finishing 14th at the IRA regatta. Despite the finish for the varsity boat, the 2009 season looks bright for Todd's crews with several members of the Freshman 8+ returning from a fifth place finish at IRAs.

Oregon State Facilities

Oregon State Crew Facilities

Oregon State University enjoys one of the nation's finest rowing facilities, located just one mile from campus. The main boathouse has two storage bays and a workshop bay, along with a fully equipped athletic training facility. The boathouse has storage room for 28 eights and oars. The shop bay is equipped to handle anything from minor repairs to major restoration of wooden and composite shells. The small boathouse has storage for 10 fours, 12 pairs, and eight singles.

The Stephens locker room has lockers, showers, and a drying room for over 50 athletes.

The strength barn has two levels – the main level contains 30 Concept II ergometers, in addition to a classroom/video room. The upstairs level has a free-weight circuit and 30 ergometers. The facility also has 200 feet of lighted launching dock and seven safety coaching launches (motor boats).

The facility also includes a separate building behind the main boathouse that houses a 16-person rowing tank. Oregon State is the only university on the west coast with tanks.

In Corvallis, the Beavers practice on the Willamette River, which borders the east side of town. Oregon State hosts races in Vancouver, Wash., on the waters of Vancouver Lake and near Eugene, Ore. at Dexter Lake.



Training & Racing

Crews are on the water from autumn to spring, with spring being the true race season. The spring season runs from March through the beginning of June. In addition to the training done on the water, crews will also spend time in the weight room and on indoor rowing machines (ergometers).

In collegiate rowing, the chief competitive focus is on racing eight-oared shells. The standard race distance is 2,000 meters, conducted in a head-to-head format, where there may be up to six crews racing each other at a time.

In the typical season, the Oregon State crew maintains a roster of approximately 40 student-athletes. The travel squad typically includes a varsity eight, junior varsity eight, a varsity four, and freshman/novice eight.

During the spring racing season, the team will travel to competitions up and down the West Coast – from San Diego to Victoria, British Columbia, and east to face programs such as Wisconsin and Boston University. The Pacific-10 regatta is the season-ending championship, traditionally held at a California locale. If crews qualify at the Pac-10 Championships, they travel to the Intercollegiate Rowing Association Championships, held in Camden, N.J. on the Cooper River.
