

# OREGON STATE UNIVERSITY

Oregon State is a leading research university located in one of the safest, smartest, greenest small cities in the nation. Situated 90 miles south of Portland, and an hour from the Cascades or the Pacific Coast, Corvallis is the perfect home base for exploring Oregon's natural wonders.

Oregon State University has always been a place with a purpose — making a positive difference in quality of life, natural resources and economic prosperity in Oregon and beyond. Through discovery, innovation and application, we are meeting challenges, solving problems and turning ideas into reality.

Founded in 1868, Oregon State is the state's Land Grant university and is one of only two universities in the U.S. to have Sea Grant, Space Grant and Sun Grant designations. Oregon State is also the only university in Oregon to hold both the Carnegie Foundation's top designation for research institutions and its prestigious Community Engagement classification.

As Oregon's leading public research university, with \$285 million in external funding in the 2014 fiscal year, Oregon State's impact reaches across the state and beyond. With 12 colleges, 15 Agricultural Experiment Stations, 35 county Extension offices, the Hatfield Marine Sciences Center in Newport and OSU-Cascades in Bend, Oregon State has a presence in every one of Oregon's 36 counties, with a statewide economic footprint of \$2.232 billion.

Oregon State welcomes a diverse student body of over 30,058 students from across Oregon, all 50 states and more than 100 countries. They can choose from more than 200 undergraduate and more than 80 graduate degree programs, including over 30 degrees online offered through Oregon State Ecampus. Oregon State increasingly attracts high-achieving students, with nationally recognized programs in areas such as conservation biology, agricultural sciences, nuclear engineering, forestry, fisheries and wildlife management, community health, pharmacy and zoology.

Oregon State also ranks high in sustainability, fourth among universities nationwide for using renewable energy and first in the Pac-12 Conference. And our students literally help power the university: 22 exercise machines at Dixon Recreation Center are connected to the grid.

The 400-acre main campus in Corvallis includes a Historic District, making Oregon State one of only a handful of U.S. university campuses listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The district includes such icons as Weatherford Hall, the Memorial Union and Benton Hall, the oldest building on campus.

Oregon State is located in Corvallis, a vibrant college town of 55,000 in the heart of Western Oregon's Willamette Valley. Corvallis consistently ranks among the best and safest cities to live in the U.S., as well as among the most environmentally responsible.

Dr. Edward J. Ray became president of Oregon State University on July 31, 2003.

Under his leadership, OSU has completed and updated a visionary campus-wide strategic plan that has served as the framework for the university's development in profound and historic ways. Annual research awards and contracts have increased substantially and totaled nearly \$285 million in fiscal year 2014.

President Ray partnered with the OSU Foundation to launch the university's first comprehensive fundraising campaign. The

public phase launched in October 2007 with an initial goal of \$625 million. By the end of the Campaign for OSU on December 31, 2014, its total reached \$1.14 billion, including nearly \$189 million for scholarships and fellowships, 79 newly endowed faculty positions, and funding for key scientific and learning facilities like the Lois Bates Acheson Veterinary Teaching Hospital, the Hallie Ford Center for Healthy Children and Families, The Linus Pauling Science Center, the International Living Learning Center, a renovated Furman Hall for the College of Education, the Graduate Studies Center at the OSU-Cascades Campus and four new cultural centers.

Mindful of OSU's commitment to the people of Oregon, Dr. Ray has overseen the expansion of dual-enrollment agreements to all 17 of the state's community colleges, making it easier for students to complete four-year degrees. He has also taken a leadership role in fostering a more seamless P-20 system, working with area school superintendents, community college leaders and university colleagues to strengthen institutional connections and enhance the student experience. Dr. Ray has also helped to usher in a new era of partnership and cooperation between Oregon's public universities. In Central Oregon, an effort to expand OSU-Cascades by fall 2015 to a robust four-year branch campus of Oregon State has begun, thanks to strong state and community support and financial investment.

In addition to his work at OSU, Dr. Ray's leadership extends to many organizations. He serves on boards of the American Council on Education and the Association of Public Land-grant Universities and chairs the Association of American Colleges and Universities. In recognition of his contributions to higher education, he received the 2013 CASE District VIII Leadership Award.

Dr. Ray was a member of the economics faculty at Ohio State from 1970-2003, serving as economics department chair from 1976 to 1992. He served as associate provost from May 1992 until May 1993, senior vice provost and chief information officer from 1993-1998, and executive vice president and provost from 1998-2003.

His research interests include the history of protectionism in the United States, the determinants of U.S. foreign direct investment and foreign direct investment in the United States, the structure of tariff and non-tariff trade barriers in the United States and abroad, and the adoption of Social Security. His work has been published in *The American Economic Review*, *The Journal of Political Economy*, *The Quarterly Journal of Economics*, *The Review of Economic Studies*, *The Review of Economics and Statistics*, and other leading journals. He has co-authored a principles text, and his book, "U. S. Protectionism and the World Debt Crisis," was published by Quorum Press in 1989.

Dr. Ray received his undergraduate degree in mathematics from Queens College (CUNY) in June 1966, graduating cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa. He earned his master's in economics from Stanford University in 1969 and his doctorate in economics also from Stanford in June 1971.

Dr. Ray's wife Beth passed away in March 2014. He has three children and three grandchildren.

## GILL COLISEUM

Legendary Gill Coliseum is the home of the Oregon State men's basketball, women's basketball, women's gymnastics, wrestling and volleyball teams. The arena can handle crowds of 9,604 for competitions on Ralph Miller Court, and the building also includes a weight room, equipment center, locker rooms and offices for the athletic department and its teams.

Named after the late Slats Gill, who was Oregon State's head men's basketball coach for 36 years, the Coliseum is an excellent facility spanning more than an acre.

Gill Coliseum was recently renovated with improvements totaling more than \$3.5 million. The renovation included sandblasting, sealing and painting the exterior shell and new exterior windows and doors. Additionally, an elevator was installed to increase access for students and fans with disabilities.

Gill Coliseum also has a state-of-the-art sports medicine center, located on the lower level, that provides leading-edge injury prevention and rehabilitation services. The center includes cardiovascular equipment and improved training facilities.

The renovation project also upgraded Gill's locker rooms. While a new men's basketball locker room was already completed, a new women's basketball locker room is now open with improvements to the volleyball and soccer locker rooms also being done.

With the improvements, Gill Coliseum continues to be an integral part of the heritage of Oregon State athletics. Since its opening in 1949, Gill Coliseum has been part of more than 3,000 victories, more than 150 Oregon State All-Americans and more than 25 individual and team titles.



## OSU BASKETBALL CENTER

Opened in the summer of 2013, the OSU Basketball Center is the most recent addition to Oregon State Athletics' facility portfolio. It is complete with two regulation basketball courts, which occupy the first and third floors of the building, along with locker rooms, satellite training and medical areas, and service and mechanical spaces.

The alternate floors -- second and fourth -- consist of 2,000-square-foot partial floors containing coach and program staff offices. These spaces run the length of the building and offer panoramic views of the court below. Together, the court and program space create a "home" where the sense of family that is the distinctive edge for every Oregon State team can be fostered.

A two-story glass atrium, strikingly illuminated at night, serves as the main entrance and feature a Basketball Hall of Fame highlighting the greatest achievements and coaches -- of Oregon State Beavers basketball.

Todd Stansbury was named vice president and director of athletics at Oregon State University June 18, 2015, rejoining the Pac-12 Conference institution after serving as the Beavers' executive associate athletic director from February 2003 to January 2012. He officially began his new role Aug. 1, 2015.

"Todd is committed to high-level athletic achievement by competing and winning championships the right way - the Oregon State way," OSU president Ed Ray said upon Stansbury's hiring. "He is very skilled at growing fan excitement and engagement, and will guide the success of our student-athletes in sports, academics and community."

During his previous tenure at Oregon State, Stansbury was part of the senior leadership team that led a renaissance of Oregon State athletics. The Beavers played in eight bowl games; the baseball team won two College World Series titles; and nearly every program advanced to postseason play while Stansbury was in Corvallis during his first stint. He was also instrumental in fundraising for the \$150 million Reser Stadium expansion, the re-introduction of the women's track and field program, the renovation of Goss Stadium at Coleman Field, and the construction of the Sports Performance Center, the Beth Ray Student Success Center, the OSU Boathouse and the Whyte Track and Field Center.

While the 54-year-old Stansbury has led high-profile coaching searches, facility expansion and construction projects during his athletics career, he also has been instrumental as a leader of student-athlete

Without Borders; resurrected the Varsity Knights program; and partnered with several local and national student-athlete leadership and achievement programs.

Stansbury's first role as a director of athletics came in July of 2000 when he was hired at East Tennessee State University. He initiated and implemented a program-wide strategic plan and reorganization while completing numerous infrastructure and capital projects, including the development of a state-of-the-art golf practice facility and the expansion of the athletic training facility into an outpatient rehabilitation center. In addition to numerous athletic accomplishments, ETSU was recognized by USA Today for increasing the graduation rates of its student-athletes while under his direction.

Stansbury began his professional career as a banker in the asset-based lending division of Citizens and Southern National Bank in Atlanta before returning to the Georgia Institute of Technology (Georgia Tech), his alma mater, as an academic counselor for football in 1988.

As the assistant athletic director for academics at Georgia Tech, he was responsible for the overall development and management of the educational support program for student-athletes. This platform was a major component of the Homer Rice Total Person Program, which was adopted nationally by the NCAA Foundation and Division I-A athletic directors as the NCAA Champs/Life Skills Program. Georgia Tech was consistently recognized nationally for its graduation rates while Stansbury served in this capacity.

In 1995 Stansbury left Georgia Tech to become the global coordinator for the Institute for International Sport. In this capacity he and his wife, Karen, spent 16 months traveling around the world promoting the 1997 World Scholar-Athlete Games and developing a global network of educators, sport organizations and government leaders.

Upon his return to the U.S. in 1996, Stansbury worked for Southern Network Services in Birmingham, Ala., as the manager of internet business services where he developed the business plan for the new internet services division.

He returned to intercollegiate athletics in 1997 at the University of Houston, serving as associate athletic director. His responsibilities included NCAA compliance and student-athlete support services. He also served as the primary liaison to the university's administrative units. Under his direction the student-athlete support program was transformed and recognized by USA Today for increasing graduation rates.

The Oakville, Ontario, native attended Georgia Tech on a football scholarship where he lettered as a linebacker and graduated with a B.S. in industrial management in 1984. He was a third round draft choice of the Saskatchewan Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League. He later completed a M.S. in sports administration at Georgia State University in 1993.

Married to the former Karen Hammond of Easley, S.C., the Stansburys' interest in the outdoors and travel has led to a number of adventures including trekking the Himalayas of Nepal, tracking the mountain gorilla in the Congo (Zaire) and sailing the Whitsunday Islands of Australia.

Stansbury is among the most experienced administrators in the NCAA. His work includes serving on numerous national and conference boards, including the Football Oversight Committee, the American Athletic Conference Finance Committee and several UCF boards.

With his leadership skills, wealth of experience and integrity, Oregon State athletics will continue to be a source of pride for Beaver Nation and be a competitor for conference and national championships while maintaining a strong emphasis on academic excellence.

growth on and off the field. He is part of a team that developed several key lifeskills career development initiatives at OSU. These include the Everyday Champions program which encompasses the Leadership Institute, Varsity OSU and the international service program Beavers Without Borders, among others.

Between his tenures at Oregon State, Stansbury served as the vice president and director of athletics at the University of Central Florida in Orlando from March 1, 2012 through June 18, 2015. He led the Knights to a successful transition from Conference USA to the American Athletic Conference where UCF won three titles in its initial year in the new league. Among those three championships was the football team's historic 12-1 season in 2013 that culminated in a No. 10 Associated Press final national ranking after defeating Baylor in the Fiesta Bowl. UCF also was the only Division I program in 2014-15 to win conference titles in football, volleyball, women's soccer and softball.

Academically, UCF teams combined for 15 consecutive terms with a department 3.00 GPA or higher with Stansbury at the helm. Under his leadership, the Knights boasted a 95 percent graduation rate, the top score among public institutions at the Division I level. In addition, he developed the Institute for Student-Athlete Leadership that included Knights
