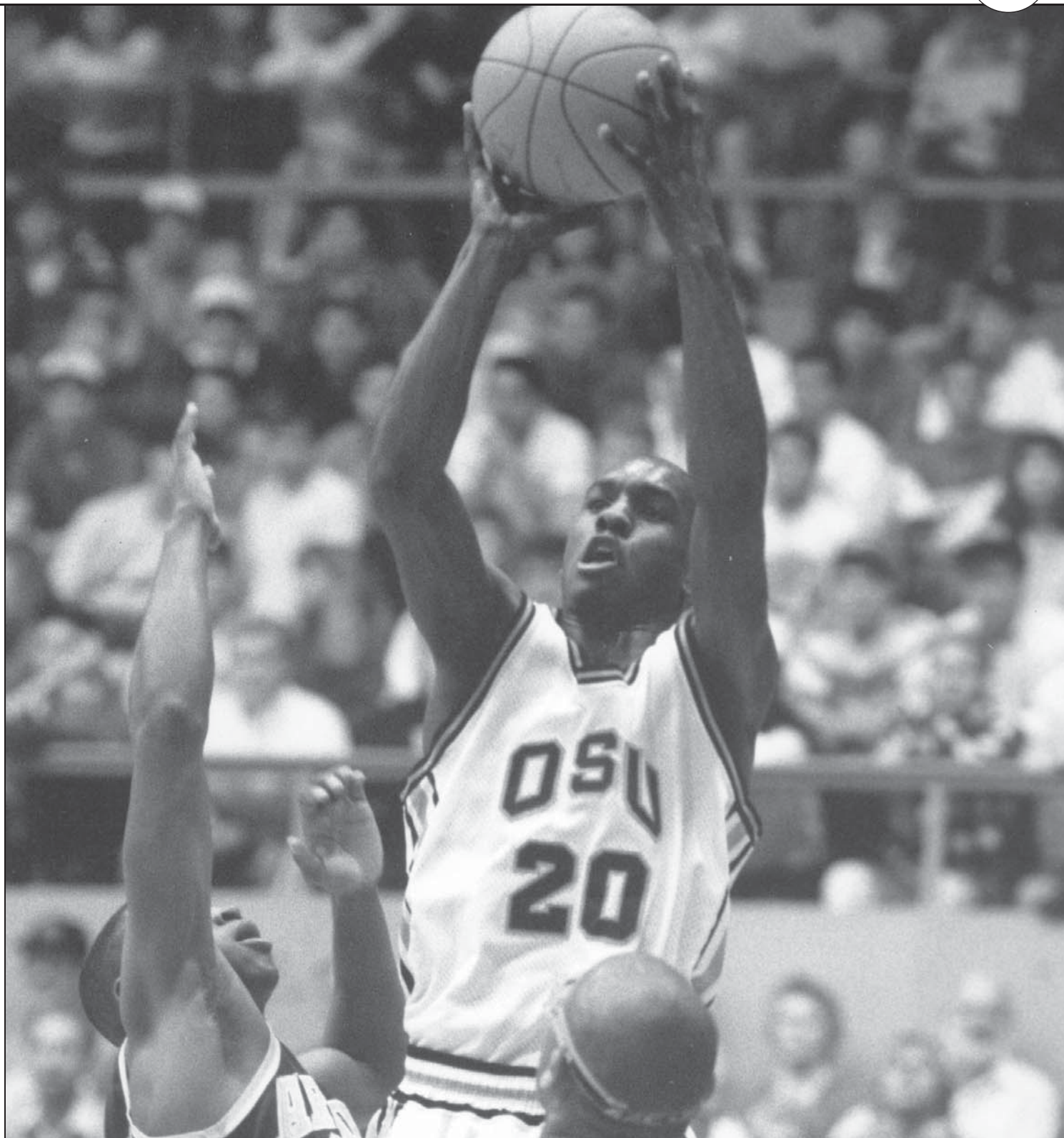

AMORY “SLATS” GILL

PLAYER — 1922 • 23 • 24

HEAD COACH — 1929 TO 1964

OSU HONORS

- Gill was inducted into the James Naismith Hall of Fame in 1968.
- Oregon State's home arena (Gill Coliseum) was officially named for him after his death. It opened in 1949 and was originally just called the Oregon State Coliseum, though it was informally known as “the house that Gill built.”
- A banner was unveiled in Gill Coliseum in 1997 signifying his number of wins (599).
- He was inducted into the State of Oregon Hall of Fame in 1980, the OSU Athletics Hall of 1988 and the Pac-10 Hall of Honor in 2003.
- He served as president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches and coached in the 1964 NABC All-Star Game.
- He is a member of the Helms Foundation Hall of Fame.
- The Slats Gill Sportsperson of the Year Award is presented annually to the top coach or administrator in the state of Oregon.

OSU HIGHLIGHTS

- Gill is the all-time winningest basketball coach at OSU with 599 victories. He was the sixth-winningest coach in NCAA history at the time of his retirement.
- He coached five Pacific Coast Conference championship teams (1933, '47, '49, '55, '58) and four other Northern Division championship teams (1935, '40, '42, '54).
- Gill took the 1949 and 1963 teams to the school's only NCAA Final Four berths. Both teams finished in fourth place.
- His 1963 team won the NCAA West Regional.
- His teams tied for fifth in the NCAA on three other occasions: 1947, '55 and '62.
- He coached two eventual OSU head coaches in Jim Anderson and Paul Valenti, and two Olympians in Lew Beck and Mel Counts.
- In 36 seasons at OSU, only nine of his teams had losing records.
- He coached OSU to eight Far West Classic titles in his final eight seasons as head coach.
- His teams won the Chancellor's Trophy, given to the annual winner in the Oregon State-Oregon series, 11 out of 12 times.
- Gill made his OSU coaching debut in 1926-27 with the OSU Rooks (freshmen).
- He also coached OSU baseball from 1932-37.
- Gill retired as head coach after the 1963-64 season to become Oregon State's athletic director, and served in that role until his death on April 5, 1966.

OSU PLAYING DAYS

- Gill played three years of varsity basketball at OSU and was an All-American selection in 1924.
- He also earned All-Pacific Coast Conference first team honors in 1922 and 1924 and second team honors in 1923.
- He made the All-Northern Division first team in 1923 and 1924.

PLAYER — 1987 • 88 • 89 • 90

- A 6-foot-4 guard from Oakland, Calif. (Skyline HS).

OSU HONORS

- Selected national Player of the Year by Sports Illustrated in 1990.
- 1990 consensus All-American first team pick.
- 1990 Pacific-10 Player of the Year.
- Other 1989-90 honors: Billy Packer's U.S. Army Reserve Player of the Year, L.A. Gear Unstoppable Player of the Year, Bill Hayward Amateur Athlete for the state of Oregon, MVP of the Japan Classic All-Star Tournament.
- Three-time All-Pac-10 selection.
- All-Pac-10 Tournament selection in 1988 and 1989.
- 1987 Pac-10 Freshman of the Year and Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Year.
- Pac-10 Player of the Week nine times in his career, more than any other player.
- Three-time MVP of the Far West Classic and the only four-time all-tournament selection.
- Selected to the Pac-10 All-Decade Team for the 1980s.
- OSU jersey (#20) retired during 1996-97 season.
- Inducted into the Oregon State University Athletic Hall of Fame in 1996.
- Named to Pac-10 Conference's inaugural Hall of Honor class in 2002.

OSU HIGHLIGHTS

- The Pac-10's all-time leader for assists (938) and steals (321).
- Sixth all-time leading scorer in the Pac-10 and all-time leader at Oregon State (2,172 points).
- His 58 points vs. USC on Feb. 22, 1990 set the OSU school record and is the third-most ever in the Pac-10.
- Led OSU in scoring in 1988-89 (20.1) and 1989-90 (25.7).
- Ranks second for single-season scoring at OSU with 746 points in 1989-90 and sixth with 603 in 1988-89.
- Finished his OSU career with 16 30-plus scoring games.
- Led OSU in assists and steals all four seasons.
- Holds the top four spots on OSU's single-season assists list.
- Set the school record with 15 assists vs. Arizona State (Nov. 30, 1989).
- Holds three of the top four spots on OSU's single-season steals list.
- On OSU's all-time leaderboard, holds 10 career, seven single-season, six single-game and five consecutive-game records.
- Started every game during his four-year career.

OLYMPICS

- Member of the 1996 and 2000 Dream Teams (U.S. Olympic gold-medal winning teams)

NBA CAREER

- First-round selection (2nd pick overall) by the Seattle Supersonics in 1990.
- In the NBA, selected All-NBA nine times, All-Defensive Team nine times (including the 1995-96 Defensive Player of the Year), an All-Star Game participant nine times and a participant in the NBA Finals three times (winning the championship in 2006 with the Miami Heat).

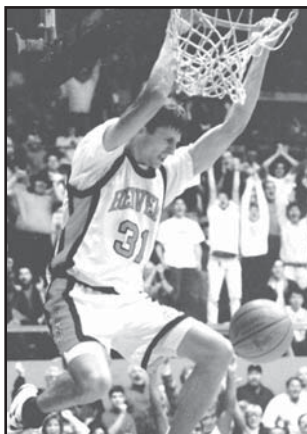

- A 6-foot-6 guard from Danville, Calif. (De La Salle HS).
- **OSU HONORS:** 1995 USBWA & NABC All-District and All-Pac-10 selection ... Two time Pac-10 Player of the Week ... Two-time Oregon State team MVP (1994 and 1995) ... Far West Classic MVP in 1993 ... Two-time Far West Classic All-Tournament selection ... A 1995 NABC All-Star.
- **OSU HIGHLIGHTS:** Finished his OSU career third in all-time steals (199) and 10th in points (1,304) ... Appears nine times on OSU's top 10 career records lists ... Broke the OSU record with eight steals vs. Arizona (Feb. 23, 1995) ... Scored a career-high 34 points vs. California (March 4, 1995) ... Second in the Pac-10 for scoring in 1995 (21.0).
- **NBA CAREER:** 1995 first-round draft pick of the Denver Nuggets (15th overall) ... Traded to the Los Angeles Clippers on draft day ... A 1996 All-Rookie second team selection ... Has played in the NBA for 12 seasons ... Has won two NBA championships with the San Antonio Spurs.



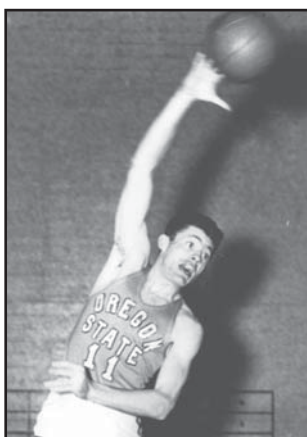

LEW BECK

PLAYER — 1942 • 43 • 47

- A 5-foot-10 guard from Pendleton, Ore. (Pendleton HS).
- **OSU HONORS:** 1947 All-American, All-Pacific Coast and All-Northern Division ... 1943 All-Northern Division first team and All-PCC second team ... Inducted into the State of Oregon Hall of Fame (1981) and the OSU Athletic Hall of Fame (1988) ... Oregon State's annual award for "outstanding newcomer" is named after him.
- **OSU HIGHLIGHTS:** At the time of his graduation, he was the school's second-leading all-time scorer (820 points) ... Led Oregon State to its first NCAA Tournament in 1947 ... Scored 20 points in NCAA Tournament games vs. Oklahoma and Wyoming ... Oregon State won the Pacific Coast Conference title in 1947 ... The team won 65 games during his tenure, including a 28-5 campaign in 1947 ... Beck helped the 1947 team win all four games vs. Oregon ... The 1947 team was the first Oregon State squad to travel by plane.
- **OLYMPICS:** Was team captain of the 1948 U.S. Olympic team, which won a gold medal in London.

PLAYER — 1978 • 79 • 80 • 81

- A 6-foot-4 guard from Portland, Ore. (Parkrose HS).
- **OSU HONORS:** A 1979-80 All-American ... Made the All-Pac-10 first team in 1980 and 1981 ... Made the 1979 Far West Classic All-Tournament team ... Inducted into the OSU Athletic Hall of Fame (2004).
- **OSU HIGHLIGHTS:** Ended his career fifth all-time in scoring at OSU (1,288 points, now 11th) ... Ranks second at OSU in total steals (205) and third in steals per game (1.85) ... Seventh all-time at OSU in field goal percentage (.539) ... Led the team in minutes played each of his last three years ... Member of the 1980-81 team that ranked No. 1 in the country.
- **NBA CAREER:** 1981 second-round draft pick of the Indiana Pacers ... Played one season with the Chicago Bulls.



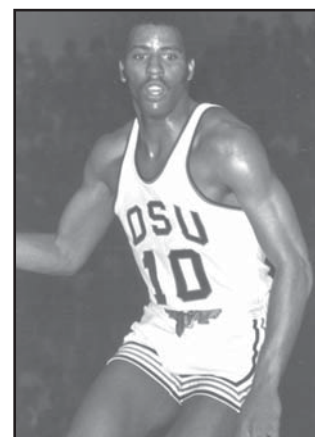

PLAYER — 1970 • 71 • 72

- A 6-foot-2 guard from Bakersfield, Calif. (East Bakersfield HS).
- **OSU HONORS:** All-American, All-Pacific Coast and All-Pac-8 in 1972 ... Two-time team MVP (1971 and 1972) ... MVP of the 1970 and 1971 Far West Classics ... Played in the 1972 NABC All-Star Game ... Inducted into the OSU Athletic Hall of Fame (1992).
- **OSU HIGHLIGHTS:** Led the team in scoring and assists two years in a row ... Had 17.8 ppg and 6.8 apg in 1970-71 and 19.8 ppg and 6.6 apg in 1971-72 ... At the end of his career, ranked fourth on OSU's career scoring chart (1,221 points) ... On OSU's career charts, ranks second in assists per game (6.70) ... Ranks fifth and sixth in school history for single-season assists ... Scored a career-high 37 points against top-ranked UCLA in 1972.
- **NBA CAREER:** 1972 first-round draft pick of the Phoenix Suns (fifth overall) ... Named to the NBA All-Rookie first team in 1972-73 ... Played six years in the NBA.

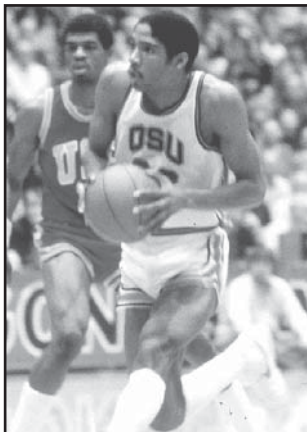

- A 6-foot-4 guard/forward from Oakland, Calif. (Fremont HS/Chabot CC).
- **OSU HONORS:** 1982 All-American, Pac-10 MVP, All-Pac-10 and team MVP ... Two-time Pac-10 Player of the Week in 1982 ... Named to the Pac-10 All-Newcomer team in 1981 ... Inducted into the OSU Athletic Hall of Fame (1994).
- **OSU HIGHLIGHTS:** Led OSU to Pac-10 crowns in 1981 and 1982 and was a member of the #1-ranked team in the country in 1981 ... Set OSU's single-season record for steals with 91 (now tied for second) ... On OSU's career lists, ranks second in steals per game (2.47) and fifth in assists per game (4.55) ... Had an OSU-record seven steals in four different games (since broken) ... Was OSU's leading scorer in 1981-82 (14.9 ppg).
- **JUNIOR COLLEGE:** Transferred from Chabot Community College, where he was the California Junior College co-Player of the Year.
- **NBA CAREER:** 1982 first-round draft pick by the Golden State Warriors (14th overall) ... Played in the NBA for 12 seasons, then became an assistant coach in the league.

- A 7-foot center from Coos Bay, Ore. (Marshfield HS).
- **OSU HONORS:** 1964 All-American second team ... 1963 Helms Foundation and Converse All-American ... Two-time MVP of the Far West Classic ... MVP of the 1963 NCAA West Regional ... OSU jersey (#21) retired during 1996-97 season ... Inducted into the OSU Athletic Hall of Fame (1988), the State of Oregon Hall of Fame (1982) and the Pac-10 Hall of Honor (2004).
- **OSU HIGHLIGHTS:** Pac-10's all-time leader for rebounds (1,375), and ranks third in career scoring average (22.2) and rebounding average (15.4) ... He is OSU's career leader in all three categories ... His 26.7 scoring average in 1963-64 is the school record and the second-highest ever in the Pac-10 ... Set OSU's career scoring record (1,973 points) and now stands third.
- **OLYMPICS:** Won a gold medal at the 1964 Olympics.
- **NBA CAREER:** 1964 first-round draft pick of the Boston Celtics (ninth overall) ... Had a 12-year career in the league ... Was part of six NBA Finals teams, with two championships.

CLIFF CRANDALL

PLAYER — 1946 • 47 • 48 • 49

- A 6-foot-2 guard/forward from Astoria, Ore. (Astoria HS).
- **OSU HONORS:** OSU's first two-time All-American ... All-American, All-Pacific Coast Conference and All-Northern Division in 1948 and 1949 ... Inducted into the State of Oregon Hall of Fame (1981) and the OSU Athletic Hall of Fame (1990).
- **OSU HIGHLIGHTS:** The first OSU player to score more than 1,000 points in a career (1,248) ... Led Oregon State to its first Final Four in 1949 ... Helped the program to the 1947 and 1949 Pacific Coast Conference titles ... Set the school record for most points in one season with 435 as a senior (since broken) ... Scored 29 points in one game vs. Oregon, the most at the time by an Oregon State player vs. the Ducks ... Scored 30 points vs. California as a junior, the most that season.
- **NBA CAREER:** Selected by the Minneapolis Lakers in the 1948 NBA Draft.



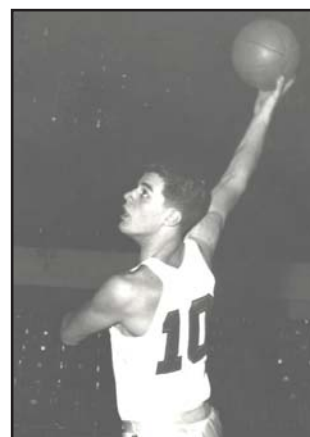

PLAYER — 1956 • 57 • 58

- A 6-foot-7 forward from Corvallis, Ore. (Corvallis HS).
- **OSU HONORS:** 1957 and 1958 All-American and All-Pacific Coast Conference ... 1957 Far West Classic MVP and made the 1956 all-tournament team ... Inducted into the State of Oregon Hall of Fame (1980) and OSU Athletic Hall of Fame (1991).
- **OSU HIGHLIGHTS:** Held OSU's career record with 1,468 points (now stands in sixth) ... His 18.8 career scoring average ranks fourth all-time at OSU ... Ranks third all-time at OSU in career rebounds (828), rebounding average (10.6) and free throws made (400) ... Scored a career-high 35 points in the 1957 Far West Classic game against Yale ... Five 30-plus scoring games for his career ... Recorded a career-high 23 rebounds on Dec. 21, 1955 vs. Northwestern.
- **NBA CAREER:** 1958 first-round draft selection by the St. Louis Hawks (seventh overall) ... Had a 12-year NBA career and won an NBA championship in 1967 with the Philadelphia 76ers.

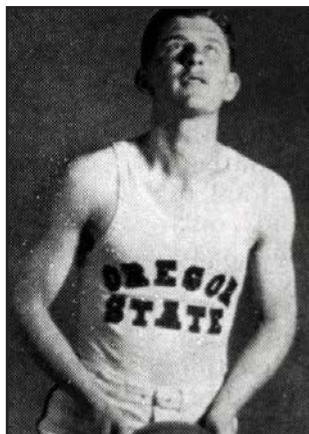

- **OSU HONORS:** A 1930 All-American ... Also named to the All-Northern Division second team in 1930 ... Inducted into the State of Oregon Hall of Fame (1983).
- **OSU HIGHLIGHTS:** His first season coincided with Slat's Gill's first season as head coach ... Scored 18 points in a game against Stanford in 1929-30, the most by any player that season ... Known for being a left-handed sharpshooter ... OSU went 45-30 and had winning seasons in each of his three years ... A team co-captain as a senior.

- A 6-foot guard from Los Angeles, Calif. (University HS)
- **OSU HONORS:** A 1959 All-American second team selection by the Helms Foundation ... Also made the All-Pacific Coast Conference first team in 1959 ... The 1958 Far West Classic MVP and an all-tournament team selection in 1957 ... Inducted into the OSU Athletic Hall of Fame (1991).
- **OSU HIGHLIGHTS:** The 1957-58 Beavers shared the PCC regular season title ... Led the team in scoring as a senior (15.6 ppg) ... Twice scored a career-high 33 points as a senior, against Iowa and Idaho ... The team captain in 1958-59.
- **PRO CAREER:** Selected in the fourth round of the 1959 NBA Draft by the St. Louis Hawks ... Played in the American Basketball League.
- **POST-BASKETBALL:** Became one of Hollywood's leading makeup artists.



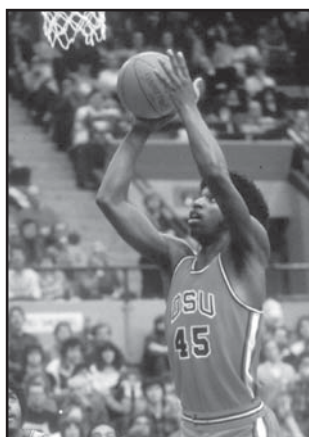

- **OSU HONORS:** 1985 All-American third team selection and Region 8 Player of the Year ... 1984 All-American honorable mention and Pac-10 Player of the Year ... Three-time All-Pac-10 selection (1983, '84, '85) ... 1984 Far West Classic MVP and three-time member of all-tournament team ... Four-time Pac-10 Player of the Week ... OSU jersey (#45) retired during 1996-97 season ... Inducted into the OSU Athletic Hall of Fame (1996) and State of Oregon Hall of Fame (2003).
- **OSU HIGHLIGHTS:** Fourth in the nation for field goal percentage (.657) in 1983-84 ... On OSU's career lists, ranks fourth in scoring (1,694 points), second in rebounds (880) and third in field-goal percentage (.602).
- **NBA CAREER:** First-round pick by the Los Angeles Lakers in 1985 (23rd overall) ... Set an NBA record by appearing in 1,192 consecutive games ... Won three NBA titles with the L.A. Lakers ... Started the 1990 All-Star Game ... Had a 16-year career.



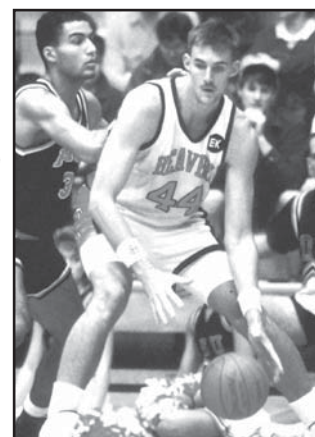

- A 6-foot-11 center from Beaumont, Calif. (Beaumont HS).
- **OSU HONORS:** A two-time All-Pac-10, USBWA and NABC All-District first team selection and team MVP (1992 and 1993) ... Three-time Pac-10 Player of the Week.
- **OSU HIGHLIGHTS:** OSU's career leader in blocked shots (172) ... Ranks second in blocked shots per game (1.55) ... Holds three of the top five single-season blocked shot marks ... On OSU's career records list, ranks 10th in career scoring (1,319 points), sixth in field goal percentage (.550) and eighth in rebounds (620) ... Led the Pac-10 in 1991-92 in field goal percentage at .612 (16th in the nation) ... Scored a career-high 33 points against USC on Feb. 25, 1992.
- **NBA CAREER:** 1993 first-round draft pick by the Indiana Pacers (14th overall) ... Played with the Pacers for one season.

PLAYER — 1963 • 64 • 65

- A 6-foot guard from Roseburg, Ore. (Roseburg HS).
- **OSU HONORS:** A 1965 All-American, All-AAWU Conference and team MVP ... An NABC All-Star Game participant in 1965 ... The 1964 Far West Classic MVP and a 1963 all-tournament selection ... Inducted into the State of Oregon Hall of Fame (1987) and OSU Athletic Hall of Fame (1991).
- **OSU HIGHLIGHTS:** Helped Oregon State to the 1963 Final Four and 1964 NCAA Tournament ... Ended his career fourth on OSU's all-time scoring list (1,142 points) ... Color analyst on Oregon State basketball cable broadcasts in the early '90s.
